

Corrugated Paper

Young people need to be aware of their surroundings. Find squares, rectangles, rounds and the hardest triangles in everyday materials:

- Squares: bottoms of milk cartons
- Rectangles: envelopes, sheets of paper, tissue boxes
- Rounds: top and bottom of a glass
- Triangles: diagonal fold of a square

Grade Levels 5-8

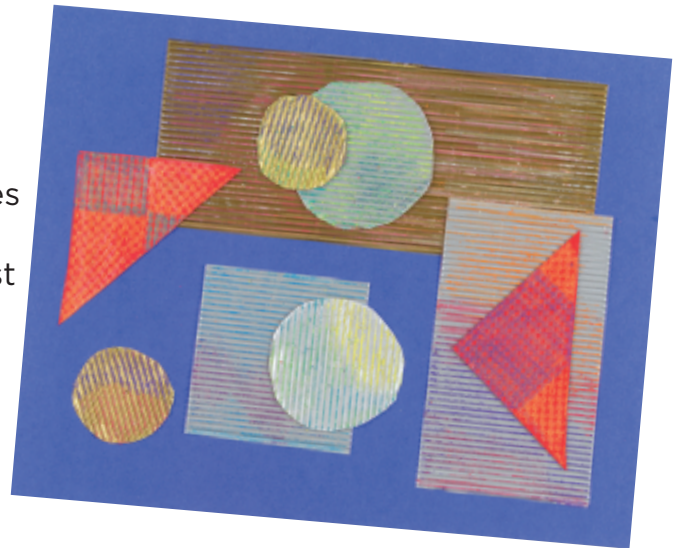
Note: instructions and materials based on a class of 25 students. Adjust as needed.

Process

1. Trace shape onto the corrugated paper in several sizes.
2. Use the Cray-Pas to add color by making strokes over the corrugated paper.
3. Glue the shapes to a rectangle or square at least 11" x 14" or 12" x 12".

Options

1. Stick to monochromatic color themes
2. Use black Cray-Pas® only

Materials

Blick Washable Glue (23872-1044), on 4-oz bottle per student
