Float People

The artist, Marc Chagall, is known for his paintings of floating, dream-like people, animals and objects. These images are full of color and movement, and set in sky-like settings. Chagall was born in Russia in 1887 but traveled extensively in Europe and America, eventually settling in Paris, France, with a group of famous artists. He was similar to other artists in his desire to work with a variety of materials. Some of his most famous works were realized in stained glass, ceramics and theatrical design. In this lesson plan, students will design "Float

Process

- 1. Cut a body, arms, legs and feet out of colored construction paper. It should be no longer than 24", just long enough to "float" when its head is attached.
- 2. Draw clothing on the body using crayons.
- 3. Blow up a glove to approximately 8" in diameter. Seal it by tying a knot in the "neck."
- 4. Draw a face on the glove head with markers. Add hair, eyes, noses and other details.
- 5. Punch a hole in the neckline and attach a 10" long piece of cotton warp to it. Attach the other end to the glove neck. Tie another long piece of warp to a piece of "hair" on the glove and suspend the finished work from the ceiling.
