# Chenille Stem Stitchery

## Based on the simplistic design style of Joan Miró

Spanish painter Joan Miró is known for his playful art. Although he was a world renowned artist, his work gives the impression it could have been created by a child. Miró was interested in reducing characters to their simplest forms and using very basic, bright colors. He felt some of the best ideas were inspired by the simplest things.

After reviewing some of Joan Miró's later paintings, it is evident that even very young students can create a work of art fashioned after Miró. Using Chenille Stems and stitchery canvas, this project is clean and easy for any classroom.

### **Grade Levels K-6**

Note: instructions and materials are based upon a class size of 25 students. Adjust as needed.

## **Preparation**

1. View examples of Joan Miró's art. Recommended resources:

Taschen Book Series Famous Artists. Miró (70033-1062)

Artists of the 20th Century DVDs, Miró (70096-1004)

2. Cut Colossal Stems in half.



# **Materials**

Chenille Kraft® Colossal Stems, 19-1/2", pkg of 50 assorted colors (61140-5009); share one pkg across class

Chenille Kraft<sup>®</sup> Stems, assorted, pkg of 100 assorted colors (60923-); share 5-6 pkgs across class

Colorful Plastic Canvas, 10-1/2" x 13-1/2", White (63103-1044); one per student

Snippy<sup>®</sup> Scissors pointed, package of 12 (57040-2009); need one pair per student

Faber-Castell® Erasable Crayons, set of 25 (67808-1025); share two sets across the class



- 1. Students plan out their Miró design and draw it directly on the plastic canvas using erasable cravons. The cravons will allow for any "mistakes" to be removed and the design to be reworked.
- 2. Using a variety of colors and sizes of Chenille Kraft Stems, "stitch" the design into the canvas weaving the stem in and out of the holes. The stems are stiff and don't require a needle for stitching - they are also flexible enough to bend in and out of the holes in the canvas. The stems can be cut with scissors for students who want to work with smaller amounts of color at a time. Fill in large color areas with the Colossal Stems and make finer lines and details by using the smaller stems. Make sure to stitch in and out closely together to alleviate the canvas from showing through if that is the desired result.





3. When each stem is used to its' fullest, bend the tip to the back of the canvas it so it is not sticking out the front.

## **Options**

Study other artists, perhaps the impressionists, to inspire a design. Use colors and shapes to represent the artist of choice.
