Painted Accordion Books

with Ribbon Closure (art + literature)

The accordion book is one of the simplest binding processes and can be accomplished in many different ways. This lesson plan approaches the book as a combination between a painting and a literary piece. Students will paint or create a collage on two miniature canvas panels to use as covers and incorporate a tie closure to hold it together. By creating a work of art on the outside of the book, the contents will be viewed as personal treasures.



Note: instructions and materials based on a class of 25 students. Adjust as needed.

Objectives

- Students will learn a very basic bookbinding technique incorporating a dimensional object and simple fastening method
- Students will recognize that a handmade book is a work of art in itself
- Students will achieve step one in the creation of a finished piece of personal value. The art of creating the book will continue as a sketchbook, writing surface or scrapbook is developed

Preparation

 Cut drawing paper into 4" wide x 24" long pieces. For younger ages, you may want to pre-fold the paper.

Process

- Paint canvas panels with any image, pattern or color, making sure edges are covered. Allow to dry.
- 2. Fold paper for the inside pages Start by measuring 4" from one end and making the first fold. Use that fold as a guideline to fold the rest of the sheet, accordion style.



Materials

Blick Canvas Panels, 4" x 4" (07008-0044) need two per student

Blick Matte Acrylic, assorted colors (00727-), share at least six bottles across classroom

Blick White Sulphite Drawing Paper, 18" x 24" sheets (10209-1049), need 1/4 sheet per student

Aleene's® Tacky Glue, (23826-1005), share five 8-oz bottles across classroom

Blick Scholastic Wonder White round size 4 (05381-1004) and bright size 10 (05381-1010), need one each size per student Color Masking Tape (23008-), assorted color rolls, share four rolls across classroom

Armada™ Lollypop Scissors (57057-1007), need one per student

Blick Aluminum Ruler, 18" (55430-1018), need one per student

Ribbon Rainbow (61498-1009)

Assorted Metallized Beads (60776-1008) Blick's Wooden Bead Assortment (60708-1000) or Glass Globs (34924-1106) for closure

Blick Economy Graphite Pencil (20302-2009), box of 12, need one per student

Process, continued

Repeat until page is completely folded.

- 3. Glue bead or Glass Glob in the center of the front canvas panel (painted side). To place a word or small picture under the Glass Glob, place it on top the word and trace the shape lightly with a sharp pencil. Cut the word out by cutting well on the inside of the line you traced. Glue the word in the center of the panel, then glue the Glass Glob on top of it. See example at right.
- 4. There are 2 ways to attach the tie to the back canvas panel:
 - Use colored masking tape. Lay one strip of masking tape down in the center of the back panel (painted side), tuck edges around. Center the tie over the masking tape, use another piece to secure. Make sure the tape edges are cut cleanly.
 - Center the tie over the back panel (unpainted side) and complete step 4, using the page to secure the tie. The texture of the tie will interfere with the back page, but the back cover of the book will be clear.
- 5. Flatten the folded paper and apply glue to the front page. Try to get as close to the edges as possible. Center on the back canvas panel and press down. Next, apply glue to the top page again. Place front canvas panel over the top, taking care to align it with the back canvas panel. Allow glue to dry completely, then use tie to close.

Options

- For younger ages, skip step 3 and just use the tie as closure
- Use paper collage, as in the example on page 1 or glue photos on the front panel
